IRCC and STC collaboration

- The Longitudinal Immigration Database (IMDB) was created in 1997.
- IRCC and Statistics Canada have been in collaboration extensively on the development since its beginning.


Context of immigration in Canada

- Two options to reside in Canada
 - Non-permanent residency
 - Permanent residency
- Immigrants are admitted as permanent residents for different reasons
 - Economic immigrants: Contributing to Canada's economy (60%)
 - Sponsored family: Reuniting with family members (27%)
 - Refugees: Seeking protection and escaping persecution (12%)
- Immigrants represent 21.9% of the population (2016 Census)

What is the Longitudinal Immigration Database (IMDB)?

- A database updated annually, the 2016 IMDB includes:
 - All immigrants admitted to Canada from 1980 to 2017
 - All non-permanent permits from 1980 to 2017
 - Tax files from 1982 to 2016 for linked immigrants
- A database that :
 - provides longitudinal, detailed, and reliable data on socio-economic outcomes of immigrants after admission
 - Permits analysis on immigrants' past non-permanent residency activity
 - Connects short- and long-term outcomes with characteristics at admission

What are some of the immigration data included in the IMDB?

- **For permanent residents :**
 - Admission category & admission date
 - Intended occupation
 - Knowledge of official language at admission
 - Country of birth
 - Intended place of residence in Canada
 - And more...
- **For individuals with non-permanent resident permits:**
 - Document type (refugee claims, work or study permits),
 - Effective and valid date
 - Study level & skill level
 - Selection program
 - And more..

What are some of the tax data included in the IMDB for immigrants?

- Individual and family level incomes :
 - Employment income
 - Social assistance
 - Industry of employment (NAICS)
 - Tax credit for post-secondary education
 - Place of residence for taxation year
 - And much more...
- Family composition for each tax year
 - Family size
 - Marital status, spousal identifier
 - Number of children, by age
 - Number of immigrants in the family


What are the advantages of using the IMDB?

- Longitudinal design permits analysis of cohorts over time
- Detailed annual update of socio-economic outcomes at the person and family level
- Its administrative nature facilitated numerous enhancements/integration over the years, e.g. linkages to social surveys and administrative databases.
- Permits detailed analysis of small populations e.g. Syrian refugees

Measuring incomes trends


Median total income of principal applicants who were economic immigrants admitted in 2006, by years since admission

Measuring mobility


Five year retention rates by economic regions for immigrants without pre-admission permits admitted in 2011 with Nova Scotia as intended province of residence

Event history analysis


Probability of retention of immigrants admitted to Atlantic provinces by pre-admission experience

Recent IMDB enhancements

- Data integration to the IMDB
 - Wages and salaries data from T4
 - Children family data from T1FF
 - Settlement service data
- New variables to the IMDB
 - Citizenship acquisition date
 - Syrian refugee flag
 - Express entry flag (i.e. immigrant selection)

Accessing IMDB related data at a Research Data Centre (RDC)


RDCs are secure computer laboratories on university campuses that house Statistics Canada microdata master files

Researchers are deemed employees of Statistics Canada

Major statistical software packages


Type of research - academic	Description
Faculty research (non-student)	A research project conducted by a faculty member or staff of a Canadian post-secondary institution. The research is not funded by a federal, provincial or territorial government department.
Masters or doctoral research (students)	A research project conducted by a student of a Canadian post-secondary institution. The project forms an integral part of thesis or dissertation work that is not funded by a federal, provincial or territorial government department.
Program of research (academic)	A series of academic projects linked by a common theme; often funded by a large research grant for a program of research
Academic course	A course designed to teach graduate level students methodology related to complex survey data analysis.
Unaffiliated academic research	These steps are designed for academic projects conducted by a researcher who works for an academic institution that is not a member of the Canadian Research Data Centre Network (CRDCN).

- (Does not take long!)
On average, researchers can be granted access to data already in the RDC within 2 months.
- No fees for student research projects.
- Generally no fees for academic researchers from participating institutions.
- Access is now easier for Provincial and Territorial Government researchers.

IRCC-Statistics Canada collaboration
